





Fig. 7. Location and extent of irrigation on Baker Creek, near Big Pine, as indicated by Steward (1933:Map 2). Irrigated land indicated by vertical hachure. Redrawn from Steward (1933:Map 2).

Doctrine of Prior Appropriation

- California complex water rights with hybrid systems
- West of the Mississippi Doctrine of Prior Appropriation
- "FIRST IN TIME, FIRST IN RIGHT"
- Use it or lose it rule
- Inherently exploitative



Usurped Land

- 1912 EO 1529: set aside 67,120 ac
- 1931 HR 11969: withdrew Paiute land

"For the protection of the watershed supplying water to the city of Los Angeles"

- 1932 EO 5843: revoked EO 1529; left 2914 ac
- 1937 Land Exchange Act: less desirable 1932
 ac of land-> 3 reservations, no water rights

Paiute left with <3% of originally allocated land & <0.003 of ancestral lands but no associated water rights


Owens Valley Tribal Consortium CPRG Reservation Locations





Juxtaposition of Values

- Paiute are first inhabitants, actively using water since time immemorial
- Should have water rights
- First in time, first in right
 - IF you are white
- System depends on erasure of Indigenous people
- Detrimental environmental impacts





Continued Injustice

- Paiute are 1st inhabitants, actively using water since time immemorial
- Prior Appropriation -> LA Water Rights
- Contractual -> Paiute Water Rights, lack of access
- LA provided about 80% of promised water
- Has since dropped to 17%

The Los Angeles Aqueduct & subsequent control of Indigenous lands perpetuates Indigenous erasure & oppression for the benefit of Los Angeles
